AIMS GAMES

MATHEX COMPETITION

Thursday 22nd August saw the four BBI Mathex teams compete at the Auckland Mathex Competition. There were over 120 Year 7 teams competing in the Year 7 competition and a similar number in the Year 8 competition. The Year 7 A team started strongly and led for much of the competition. The final results for the Year 7s were Year 7 A team second place and Year 7 B team third place, after the minor drama of their final answer in the dying seconds of the competition initially being marked incorrect, but being accepted after a recheck. The Year 8 teams led from the beginning, with the competition being dominated by the two BBI teams who were in





front of everyone else and basically competing against each other. The Year 8 B team led for the majority of the competition but were overtaken by the A team as they reached the final few normally more challenging questions. The Year 8 A team finished first in under fifteen minutes, with the Year 8 B team finishing second a few minutes later and still minutes clear of the remaining teams. A great result and we believe the first time a school has finished with all four teams in a podium position. Congratulations to all the team members and a big thanks to all those who trialled for the teams in 2024.



WORLD SCHOLAR'S CUP

On Tuesday 12th and Wednesday 13th August, 36 students competed at the Auckland Regional round of World Scholar's Cup. The students' results were impressive, with countless medals and even some trophies brought home. Congratulations to all of the students that took part in this competition.

TOURNAMENT OF MINDS

On Saturday 31st August, six teams participated in the Auckland Regional Tournament of Minds competition. The students had been working on their long term challenges over the six weeks prior to the competition, and also presented their spontaneous challenge on the day. REHU TAI ORAL LANGUAGE COMPETITION

For all students, preparing and presenting a speech is a great opportunity to develop communication skills and confidence in public speaking. For the fifth year, students were taught the Rehu Tai Festival of Oral Language streams of Rap, Spoken Word, Flash Talk, and Prepared Speeches. Teachers spent several lessons teaching and explaining the different strands. Students were given a choice and prepared an oral language presentation around the topic of 'Unity'.

YEAR 7 CLASSROOM PROGRAMME

Our Year 7 classes are now into their second week of How we organise ourselves which focuses on working together in a team to be successful. Our end goal is for each class to create stalls for our Year 7 Stalls day in Term 4. Throughout the process, students will learn about the different roles within a team and small business as well as skills like communication, collaboration, and cooperation. In the next few weeks, students can share more about their ideas and where their group is headed.

YEAR 8 CLASSROOM PROGRAMME

Our Year 8 Exhibition is the culmination of two years at BBI. It is an opportunity for students to showcase their growth over the two years by leading a group inquiry into an issue and taking action. In Weeks 9 and 10, every student will go on one of two trips to the Waitakere Refuse Centre or the Botanical Gardens. Each trip has an instructor-led session, which connects to our Sharing the planet unit of inquiry. We need two adult helpers per class, so if you can help, please let your child's teacher know.

Below is some information and ways parents and whānau can help support student learning for the exhibition. More information will come out next term, as students are only beginning the unit of inquiry in Week 10, Term 3.

What is the exhibition? The exhibition is a student-driven inquiry that culminates in a collaborative experience that sees students voyage on a journey to explore, document, share their understanding, and take action on an issue. The exhibition enables students to include all of the elements of the PYP programme and is shared with the broader school community. This year, the students will explore the transdisciplinary theme of Sharing the planet.

How can you help at home? A way to help at home could be asking your child where they are, what their next steps are, and how they are considering taking action. It could also be to check in and help navigate those dynamic group challenges and offer advice when collaborating with others. Allowing students to articulate their thinking and understanding is a fantastic way to practise speaking and sharing their learning.

The more times they do this, the more confident they will be in understanding the new knowledge they have gained and be able to present their ideas concisely.

SPECIAL REPORT - SCHOOLTV - Healthy Study Habits

Although we all want our children to succeed academically, the foundation for that success lies not just in intelligence or motivation, but in the study habits they develop. Healthy study habits are essential for children to learn effectively, manage stress, and ultimately achieve their academic potential. Yet, in an age where distractions are plentiful and the pressure to perform is immense, it's more important than ever for us, as parents and caregivers, to guide our children in cultivating these habits.

First and foremost, it's crucial to understand that good study habits aren't just about spending more time hitting the books. It's about quality over quantity. Encouraging your child to have a dedicated study space, free from distractions is the first step. Instilling the importance of a routine cannot be overstated. Regular study times help



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create a sense of normalcy and discipline, making studying a part of their daily life rather than a chore.

Additionally, the way students approach their study sessions is just as important. Periodic breaks are vital in this process. Encourage your child to review their notes regularly rather than cramming before exams - this reinforces learning and reduces last-minute stress.

Finally, balance is key. While academics are important, so too is maintaining a healthy lifestyle. Adequate sleep, a nutritious diet, and regular physical activity are non-negotiable aspects of a student's life that directly influence their ability to study effectively. Fostering these healthy study habits is one of the greatest gifts we can give children, setting them up for a lifetime of learning and success.
